7. Narrative Description

The Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District is located in the eastern portion of the City of Decatur in northeast Alabama. Originally a separate incorporated city known as New Decatur and later as Albany, the area became part of Decatur in 1927. The former commercial core of New Decatur/Albany is located adjacent to the northwest corner of the district. The older portion of City of Decatur is located north of the district. Modern residential neighborhoods border the district to the east and southeast. Several additional blocks of New Decatur/Albany are located to the southwest of the district but do not retain sufficient integrity to be included in the district boundary. Modern industrial development borders the district to the west. The district is centered around Delano Park, a major public open space that was laid out as part of the planned community of New Decatur. The topography of the district is generally flat sloping gently from the northeast to the southwest.

The street grid within the district is regular except where it intersects the park and was built in accordance with the original plan of New Decatur. Sixth Avenue S.E. bisects the district in a north-south direction. Streets typically run north-south and east-west forming rectangular blocks of varying sizes.

The district is primarily residential, with 422 of its contributing resources and twenty-nine of its noncontributing resources in that use. Residences are concentrated throughout the district except within Delano Park and along Sixth Avenue S.E.

Residential buildings in the district generally fall into three stylistic categories: Late Victorian dwellings account for approximately fifty-one percent of all contributing resources, early twentieth century bungalow/Craftsman or gable front form dwelling represent approximately twenty-four percent, and the remainder including a mix of mid-twentieth century styles. Slightly less than sixty percent of the district's contributing residential buildings are one story in height with approximately thirty percent being two stories and the remainder one and one half stories. Seventy-five percent of all contributing resources are of frame construction, with masonry accounting for the remainder.

Victorian dwellings were typically built between circa 1886 and 1915 reflect national architectural trends. Stylistically, the houses are loosely based on Queen Anne patterns but generally of a more folk character with common decorative details including decorative wood shingles and/or window and vent combinations in gable ends, simple and limited sawn decorative trim, and turned or chamfered porch posts occasionally with simple gingerbread trim.

Early twentieth-century bungalow/Craftsman or gable front form dwellings are scattered throughout the district with a higher concentration of examples in the eastern and southern sections. Bungalows and gable fronts tend to be relatively simple in design and detailing with many exhibiting simple Craftsman style details such as exposed rafter ends, angle bracketed eaves, porch pillars or supports on pedestals and apron walls. A number of examples are stylistically more developed and can be classified as good examples of the Craftsman style. Mid-twentieth century houses tend to be simple in character and the majority are representative of the minimal traditional form.

Residential buildings are typically located on rectangular lots with minimal front and side yards and larger rear yards. Front yard depth varies by block with relative consistency within each block. Landscaping is typically casual and the residential areas typically retain mature tree canopies. Commercial buildings typically cover much of their sites, especially in the densely developed commercial core where party walls are common. Other than vacant lots, the district's open space is limited to Delano Park.

While no formal archaeological survey has been made, potential subsurface remains could provide additional information about the historical development of the district.

**Building Inventory**

Note that sites included in the 1982 nomination are denoted Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District.” For sites listed in the 1982 nomination, the status of the resource as listed in the original nomination is also noted to the right of the district name as “Contributing,” “Noncontributing,” or “Conditionally Contributing.” The 1982 nomination included nine vacant lots that were listed as noncontributing resources. These sites have been deleted from this inventory. One additional site from the 1982 nomination (site #151 in that inventory) has since been demolished and has also been deleted from this inventory. All sites have been renumbered based on their street addresses. The status of the resources in the present nomination is listed on the first line of each entry at the far right. The overall breakdown of resources, where the 2003 nomination omits previously listed vacant lots and accounts for previously noncontributing resources that are now contributing, is as follows:

**8. Statement of Significance**

This nomination represents an expansion of the historic district listed in the National Register as the Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District in 1983. That listing was amended in 2003 to change its historic name to the New Decatur/Albany Residential Historic District. In addition to expanding the size of the district and its period of significance, additional historical information is now provided that was not available at the time the earlier nomination was completed. This new information also results in the district's area of significance under Criterion A being changed from industry to community planning and development. The nomination also documents the district's significance under Criterion C.

**8. Statement of Significance**

The New Albany/Albany Residential Historic District is significant under Criteria A and C. The district is significant under Criterion A in the area of Community Planning and Development as a planned "new town" known alternately as New Decatur (1887-1916) and Albany (1916-1927) prior to its incorporation into the City of Decatur in 1927. The town was developed by the Decatur Land Improvement and Furnace Company in 1887 under the leadership of Major E. C. Gordon, recognized for his role in the development of other late-nineteenth century towns such as Sheffield, Alabama. Nationally recognized landscape architect Nathan Franklin Barrett (1845-1919) was hired to design the new town and his plan exemplifies the late nineteenth-century trend to develop a totally planned community incorporating a central park as the focal point of surrounding development. While Barrett's design was only partially implemented, much of its overall form was built and remains in evidence. Its central park space, now known as Delano Park, remains as a principal focal point and landmark of the neighborhood. The district is also significant under Criterion C for its residential architecture that includes examples of many of the styles of American architecture popular in the late nineteenth through the mid-twentieth centuries. As a group, these buildings reflect the historical development of New Decatur/Albany. In addition, the park retains several buildings and structures designed by Carolyn Cortner Smith, often recognized as "Alabama's first female architect." The district's period of significance extends from 1887, the date of its establishment, through 1954, the date of the last major civic building to be constructed within in Delano Park.

*Expansion of the New Decatur/Albany Residential Historic District*

The Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1983. Encompassing 72 acres and including 228 resources, the original district represented only a portion of the surviving residential area of New Decatur/Albany. The boundaries of the Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District excluded Delano Park, the central landscape feature of the planned community, and the remaining portions of the neighborhood's residential areas to the south of the park. This nomination expands the boundaries of the Albany Heritage Neighborhood Historic District to include a total of 207 acres and 479 resources and provides additional documentation that was not available in 1983. In addition, the nomination expands the district's period of significance to 1954, reflecting the continual development of the residential portion of the area ending with the construction of the last major community facility to be built in Delano Park, Fire Station #1. The revised boundaries of the district reflect the surviving resources associated with the planned community of New Decatur.

The 1983 nomination cited industry as the district's area of significance. While development of the neighborhood of New Albany/Decatur was initiated by the Decatur Land Improvement and Furnace Company, a company involved in industrial development, no industrial facilities were built within the district's boundaries. The significance of the neighborhood is more accurately defined in terms of community planning and development and architecture. This nomination therefore removes industry as an area of significance for the district.

In 1995, the commercial section of New Decatur/Albany was listed in the National Register as a separate district called the New Decatur/Albany Historic District. The nomination, prepared by Thomason and Associates, provides an excellent summary of the historical development of New Decatur/Albany. Recognizing that the historical narrative applies to both the commercial and residential areas of New Decatur/Albany, this nomination quotes extensively from that text. Indented paragraphs are quotations from the 1995 nomination unless otherwise noted. While the two districts are separated only by a single noncontributing property, the orientation of the commercial district results in two districts that remain visually distinct from one another.

Historical Narrative

The government formally granted Alabama statehood in 1819 and in the following year, President Monroe ordered the town of Decatur to be laid off in sections 7, 17, and 18 in Township 5, Range 4 west. That same year, patents were issued to the "Decatur Land Company." Although there was a fair amount of real estate activity at this time, the growth of the town was slow. Decatur incorporated in 1826 and served as a trading center and river terminal but the existence of the Muscle Shoals on the Tennessee River below Decatur was a major obstacle to growth.<sup>1</sup> In the 1830s, the construction of the Tusculumbia-Decatur Railroad line improved the situation by offering an inland route to bypass the rocky shoals. But, the 1837 Depression caused the collapse of the state banking system and by 1850 the town claimed a population of only 606. Besides the failure of the banks and the existence of the shoals as an obstacle to river transport, the opening and attractiveness of the fertile Chickasaw lands in Mississippi was a factor contributing to Decatur's lack of growth.<sup>2</sup>

In 1855, the first train crossed the Tennessee River at Decatur and growth of the city seemed imminent. However, the 1860s brought the onset of the Civil War and when the federal troops came into Decatur in 1862, they destroyed the railroad bridge. Two years later, they razed nearly every building in the city. A federal officer described Decatur at this time as "almost depopulated, and the houses, with a few exceptions, burned or torn down."<sup>3</sup> Following the war, businesses slowly began the rebuilding process. The reconstruction of the railroad lines and the 1871 incorporation of the Nashville and Decatur Railroad into the L & N Railroad System played a major role in the successes of the area but a big fire in 1877 and the 1878 yellow fever epidemic again slowed improvement. Fortunately, the L & N Railroad had built massive shops in Decatur providing employment opportunities and giving some impetus to the economy.

At the end of this decade, records indicate the city was earnestly rebuilding: lighting, sanitation, and roads were improved.<sup>4</sup> The Bank of Decatur was formed and in the late 1880s, the first real economic boom was seen. In 1887, the Decatur Land Improvement and Furnace Company acquired 5,600 acres in and adjacent to Decatur. Led by Major E. C. Gordon, developer of Sheffield, Alabama, the firm advertised across the country, touting New Decatur as the "Gateway City."<sup>5</sup> Gordon envisioned a city that would be unsurpassed in the lower Tennessee Valley and hurried to develop the unexploited river town. An 1888 article in the Chicago Illustrated Graphic boasted that the developers of the New Decatur "secured the best talent in the designing and laying out of the town"<sup>6</sup> which featured broad avenues and a large linear park.

New Decatur was designed by noted New York landscape architect, Nathan Franklin Barrett (1845-1919). One of the eleven charter members of the American Society of Landscape Architects and one of its earliest presidents (1903), Barrett had extensive urban planning and suburban experience. He had been employed by George M. Pullman in 1880 to develop the landscape design and site the buildings for the town of Pullman, Illinois, the first planned industrial town in the United States. As he did in his designs for Pullman and later for Chevy Chase, Maryland, Barrett in his design for New Decatur juxtaposed informal elements like the irregular shaped park, traffic circles, serpentine-like carriage drives, and rounded street corners against formal street grids. Moreover, Barrett claimed to be the earliest proponent of the formal garden in America.<sup>7</sup> The Ponce-de-Leon Hotel in St. Augustine, Florida (1885-1887) contained his first efforts along these lines. Barrett's plan for New Decatur and Delano Park united the formality and axial orientation of the City Beautiful movement with the informality and natural landscaping of the picturesque style made famous by Olmstead and Downing.

Because of the yellow fever epidemic of 1888 and later financial panic of the 1890s, much of Barrett's design for Delano Park was not realized. The basic layout of what later became Delano Park was constructed, as was much of the street grid to its north and south. A planned series of radial drives centered on a water tower at the east end of the park appear to have only been partially implemented, with Riverview Drive and Tower Avenue having been constructed along with portions of the three concentric connecting streets.

[The developers] chose street names of both Confederate and Union Civil War generals to appeal to both northern and southern investors. Second Avenue, the new town's main street, was along the railroad in an area shown as "Business District" on the town plan.<sup>8</sup> Approximately 500 homes and businesses were built in 1887 in the new town, and the population jumped from 1,200 to 5,000 between January and December of 1887.<sup>9</sup>

The developers' showcase of this early period was the massive Queen Anne style Tavern built in 1888 at the corner of Grant and 6th Avenue. The elegant inn featured the work of the Tiffany Studios of New York. Another early hotel was the Casa Grande that filled the entire area on 2nd Avenue, S.E. between Johnston and Jackson Streets. (Grant Street originally stopped at the site). The opulent stables for the hotel were located two blocks north on 2nd Avenue N.E.

In 1889, the state confirmed a charter for "New Decatur," as the new town came to be known. A reorganized Decatur Land Improvement and Development Company worked hard to promote the new city and to counteract the bad publicity of the yellow fever outbreak. It circulated a brochure entitled "The Sunny South-New Decatur, the Modern Industrial City of Northern Alabama and the Tennessee Valley." The publication listed New Decatur's selling point, the advantages of its location, and discussed the extensive town improvements (roads, water works, new business and industry) made since 1887.<sup>10</sup>

In 1890, the second Muscle Shoals canal opened (the first built in the 1830s was a failure) and commerce briefly thrived as Decatur became an important river depot on the Tennessee River between Chattanooga and the Shoals. In 1892, the state moved the county seat of Morgan County from Somerville to Decatur, an indication of the town's growing prominence in northern Alabama.

A financial panic in 1892-94 halted progress. Many businesses succumbed including the showcase "Tavern" (it burned in 1923). In the last half of the decade, the economy stabilized in Decatur. Location played a major role in recruiting new industry and business to the area around the turn of the century. Decatur's role as a river port was important but equally important was its siting at the juncture of the "most

important east-west railroad line in the south"<sup>11</sup> at that time and of the growing north-south line. Many new business located in New Decatur's 2nd Avenue business district during this period.

The new city was heavily populated by northerners, and a rivalry between Old and New Decatur developed. In 1907, it was reported, "the two Decaturs are two separate corporations now grown together and about equal in size."<sup>12</sup> The New Decatur Advertiser claimed: "Old Town [Old Decatur] is situated on the Tennessee River and has been a corporation for years. It is perhaps not so well improved in buildings as New Decatur, from the fact that many of its business blocks were built long before the new town came into existence in 1887."

New Decatur came into existence in 1887 and is undoubtedly one of the best laid out and improved cities in the South. There is hardly a business block that is not of modern architecture. It is, however, not so densely built as Decatur, and covers a larger area, embracing East Decatur, South Decatur and West Decatur.<sup>13</sup>

In 1916, New Decatur changed its name to Albany, the name favored by the numerous northern transplants from Albany, New York. But, rivalry aside, both Old and New Decatur recognized the need to market the area as a whole. A joint publication of the Albany Chamber of Commerce and the Morgan Kiwanis Club in 1922, Albany-Decatur--The Upper Muscle Shoals Cities, claimed the area was "America's greatest storehouse of minerals and crude materials. The ideal location for factories."<sup>14</sup> Its central location and access to both water and trunk-line railway transportation to the major distributing centers gave the twin cities "splendid advantages to manufacturers of all classes of products."<sup>15</sup> The brochure touted thirty existing industries and a map highlighted possible locations for many more. The combined population (including the suburbs of both cities) was 20,000, having almost tripled since the turn-of-the century.<sup>16</sup> In 1927, the legislature rejoined Albany and (Old) Decatur and the following year the combined municipality of Decatur assisted the state in the construction of the first highway bridge across the Tennessee River.

The Depression affected Decatur as it did other cities throughout the country. Along with the closure of many of Decatur's business and industrial concerns, the L & N Railroad closed down its massive local operation permanently in 1933. The thirties were a hard time for Decatur but recovery was evidenced by the end of the decade when the Tennessee Valley Authority provided a public use river terminal at Decatur. A 1940 WPA guidebook stated that Decatur had 41 manufacturing plants, six wholesale houses and many retail shops.<sup>17</sup> Large enterprises included the manufacture of cotton textiles, fertilizer, steel barges, boats, brick, and tile. Cotton factors headquartered in Decatur. Also existing were three hotels and "various tourist camps and inns."<sup>18</sup>

Following World War II, Decatur again experienced a period of growth and prosperity, resulting in out-migration from the inner city neighborhoods to the suburbs.

#### Architecture

New Albany/Albany Residential Historic District includes 479 resources, of which 444 are contributing resources, 29.1 percent were constructed between 1886 and 1904; 21.8 percent were constructed between 1905 and 1919; 24.1 percent were constructed between 1920 and 1934; 19.1 percent were constructed between 1935 and 1945;

and 5.8 percent were constructed between 1945 and 1954. 228 of the resources were included in the original 1982 National Register nomination. An additional 251 resources were surveyed between 13 November 2002 and 5 March 2003 by Schneider Historic Preservation, LLC. Information on resources included in the original nomination was field-verified and updated.

Residential resources reflect the district's major periods of growth. Late-Victorian dwellings comprise the largest collection and include 222 of the contributing dwellings (52%). Of these, the majority are representative of the popular Victorian styles or are simpler folk forms with Victorian details applied. The Borden-Chenault House at 650 E. Jackson Street S.E. (site #249) and the Jervis House at 646 Sherman Street S.E. (site #431) are among a number of examples of larger scale Victorian Queen Anne style dwellings. Several examples of the Shingle style houses are also found. The majority of Victorian era dwellings are simplified folk adaptations of the Queen Anne style. This latter group includes both larger two-story variants and smaller one-story cottage examples such as the house at 305 Prospect Avenue S.E. (site #365).

The second largest collection of contributing residential resources date from the early-20th century and includes 183 resources (43%). A number of larger scale examples of Neoclassical, Colonial Revival and Tudor Revival styles are grouped toward the center of the district. The Neal-Wiley House at 646 Jackson Street S.E. (site #247) is an example of the Neoclassical style. Examples of the Colonial Revival style include the houses at 1036 and 1038 Jackson Street S.E. (sites #275 and 276). Many of the early twentieth century houses in the district are representative of common folk forms with detailing typical of the styles popular at the time. Gable front and massed plan forms are common. The majority of these dwellings have Craftsman style details, including angle-bracketed eaves, exposed rafter ends, and geometric window sash are common. There are also a number of high style Craftsman dwellings within the district. Twenty-one (5%) of the contributing residential resources were constructed after between 1945 and 1954. These houses are typically relatively small in scale and modern adaptations of Colonial Revival and Tudor Revival styles. Of the 426 residential buildings, only four were originally duplexes or apartments.

The contributing resources of the New Albany/Albany Residential Historic District include a relatively small collection of business, institutional and governmental buildings reflecting a variety of period architectural styles scattered within the much larger collection of modest residences. Nonresidential resources account eighteen of the 444 contributing resources (4%) in the district. Of these, four are churches, six are park related structures or buildings, and the remainder include a store, two garages, an office building, a high school, an armory, a fire station, a water tower, and a clubhouse. Architecturally, the religious buildings are typically late-nineteenth to early twentieth century period revivals. The one neighborhood store is a simple early-twentieth-century freestanding brick building with a flat parapet. All of the remaining nonresidential buildings and structures are located within Delano Park. The Gordon-Bibb Elementary School (site # 115) was constructed in 1923 in a simplified Neoclassical style. The Decatur Armory was designed by architect Carolyn Cortner Smith circa 1935 in a streamlined rustic style. The remaining park-related buildings and structures are similar in architectural character to the Armory. The most recent contributing resource in the district is the modernistic Fire Station #1 (site #114) built in 1954 as the last major civic building to be built within the park.

The district retains integrity, both in terms of its overall character and in terms of the condition of the majority of its resources. Scattered modern development and building demolitions within the residential areas of the neighborhood have not substantially compromised their overall historic character. The majority of the noncontributing resources (71%) were constructed after 1954.

*Delano Park*

Delano Park was incorporated in the 1887 plan of New Decatur by Nathan Franklin Barrett as a large lozenge-shaped park which would serve as the community's the focal point. The plan for Delano Park included a formal garden in the same location as the Historic Rose Garden built by the Civilian Conservation Corps (C.C.C.) in the 1930s. According to Barrett's plan, this formal landscape was to be juxtaposed with "the naturalistic instinct"--designed but wild or natural appearing plantings.

Much of Barrett's design for Delano Park was not realized. While its basic layout was established, it was not until the 1930s many of the existing park buildings and structures were completed. Carolyn Cortner Smith, who referred to by herself as "the first non-registered woman architect in Alabama," designed the stone buildings and structures in the park that were built by the W.P.A. between circa 1930 and 1938. After failing to gain admission to the architecture schools at Auburn and Yale Universities and the University of Pennsylvania, Smith spent six years studying architecture on her own and began practicing in 1913. Over the next three decades, she designed more than seven hundred houses, churches and other buildings. In addition, she owned and operated lumber mills in Courtland, Decatur, and Moulton. In the 1920s, she

was engaged by the Mars family, owners of the Mars candy company, to design buildings on "Milky Way Farms," a thoroughbred horse farm they were creating near Pulaski, Tennessee. Mrs. Smith was also a noted historic preservationist, having been involved with the W.P.A. restoration of the Old Bank building in Decatur, Alabama in the 1930s and the efforts to save Sloss Furnace in Birmingham the 1970s. Among the surviving examples of her work in the park are "Fort Decatur" (formerly the National Guard Armory building), the rose garden walls, the Girl Scout's "Little House," a gazebo, a picnic shelter, and a bathhouse.

In 1941 Delano Park was dedicated and named for Franklin Delano Roosevelt's mother. The historic rose garden in Delano Park is significant as an example of municipal rose gardens created during the W.P.A. period. In California, the Oakland Municipal Rose Garden (1934) and the Berkeley Municipal Rose Garden (1933-1937) are important representatives of this movement. In Alabama, Birmingham's Avondale Park contains another W.P.A.-built rose garden, which has been rehabilitated.

The boundaries of the New Decatur/Albany Residential Historic District are shown on an accompanying map by Schneider Historic Preservation, LLC dated 31 May 2003. The map indicates both the boundaries of the original 1983 National Register listing and this expansion.

Boundary Justification

The boundary includes the surviving portions of the residential neighborhood of New Decatur/Albany which retain sufficient historic character and resources to convey a sense of the district's historical development. Areas included represent the remaining portions of the original plan for the New Decatur/Albany neighborhood. Areas excluded from the district generally possessed higher ratios of noncontributing to contributing resources or otherwise retained insufficient integrity to warrant inclusion.

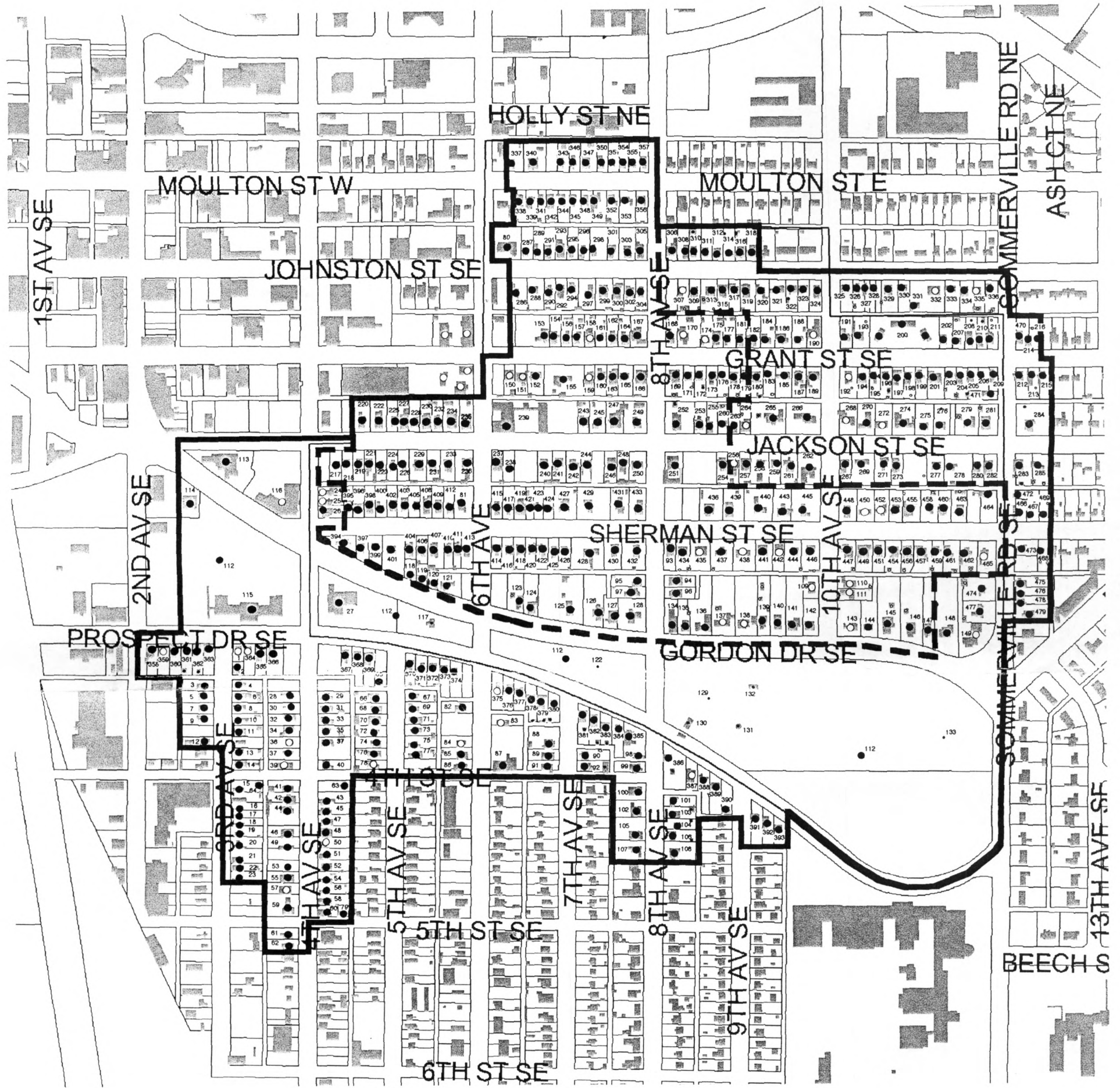
